



Research questions


- How many Pacific families in NZ are affected by long-term health conditions (LTHCs)?
- How many Pacific Peoples in NZ have a family member with a LTHC?
- What are the outcomes for Pacific children in NZ who have a family member with a LTHC?

Data sources

Population & demographics

Census 2013

- Family membership, family type/composition
- Ethnicity, Age, Gender & Socioeconomics
- Unpaid caring activities

Hospitalisations (Private & Public)

Mental health services (PRIMHD)

Pacific Peoples in the 2013 NZ Census

259, 000 Pacific Peoples living in a family

115, 500 children (aged under 18)





Equates to 79, 500 families


- 29% were multi-generational families
- 75% included at least one young person aged under 18
 - Family size ranged from two to over 19 people
 - Up to five related family nuclei living together

LTHCs in the NZ Pacific community

50, 000 families affected by LTHCs = **2 in 3** (64%) families


1 in 4 families (26%) included more than one person with a LTHC

77% of multi-generational families affected by LTHCs




LTHCs in the NZ Pacific community

174, 000 Pacific Peoples had a LTHC or lived with a family member who has a LTHC



Children affected by LTHCs in the NZ Pacific community

- 11, 430 had a LTHC
- 70, 000 had a family member with a LTHC
- 7, 500 had a LTHC
 AND had a family
 member with a LTHC

Children affected by LTHCs in the NZ Pacific community

19, 000 young Pacific Peoples from 2013 data were over 18 in 2018 and had education & employment data (% of those with 2013 data)

- Small differences in education & employment for those who had family member with a LTHC
- Having a LTHC themselves had the biggest impact on young people
- Young people with a LTHC:
 - More likely to have no secondary school qualifications (24% vs. 13%)
 - Less likely to have achieved Level 3 or 4 certificate (34% vs. 49%)

Young carers research questions

- How many young Pacific carers were there in NZ in 2013?
- What other unpaid activities were they doing?
- What were their health & mental health outcomes up to 2020?
- What communities are NZ young carers living in?


Young Pacific carers


58, 300 Pacific Peoples aged 15-24 took part in Census 2013

- **6, 951** were looking after someone in their household or helping someone outside of their household who was ill or had a disability
- 1 in 8 young Pacific People (12%) were providing unpaid care for someone with a disability or illness
 - 2, 256 (4% of young Pacific People) were the only unpaid carer in their household

Who are young Pacific carers in NZ?


78% of Pacific young carers were born in NZ (71% for non-carers)





Other unpaid activities (housework, looking after children x 2, voluntary/community work)

1 in 3 young Pacific carers are doing three or four other unpaid activities in additional to providing care



Health outcomes – hospitalisations over 7.5 years (Mar 13 to Dec 20)

17% of young carers spent 4 or more days in hospital (12% for non-carers)

16% had 4 or more admissions to hospital (14% for non-carers)

Cook Island Māori had longest total days in hospital: 18.5% (15% for non carers)

Cook Island Māori & Niueans had highest levels of admissions:

17% with 4 or more admissions (13% for non carers)

Fijians & Other Pacific Peoples had biggest differences between carers & non-carers:


15% and 15.5% with 4 or more days in hospital vs. 9% for non-carers

16% and 15.5% with 4 or more admissions vs. 11% for non-carers


Mental health outcomes

880 young Pacific carers (13%) received mental

health services and/or medication (12% for non-carers)
