CCREATE-AGE University of Auckland Doctoral Scholarships (UoADS)

Scholarship for Timeline 3: 1 JUNE: Applications close for 1 September+ start

The Centre for Co-Created Ageing Research (CCREATE-AGE) is a new University Research Centre. CCREATE-AGE addresses research questions that are informed by communities, to co-create innovative and robust research that delivers practical solutions that work in the real world, in the communities they were designed for and with.

Two University of Auckland Doctoral Scholarships will provide support to PhD candidates that wish to undertake co-created ageing research spanning more than one discipline and aligned to one or more of the three research themes and three cross cutting themes: research that will meet the self-identified needs and aspirations of older people, researchers, stakeholders and funders.

HEALTH & WELLBEING: Ensuring healthy ageing and promoting wellbeing in later life Research changing health and long term care social systems to underpin equitable access to

disease prevention, health promotion, treatment; maximising function, quality of life, and psychosocial outcomes for older people, and caregivers.

PLACE: Age friendly and dementia supportive WORK, INCOME & RETIREMENT: Age-Friendly places

Research contributing to the creation of inclusive, safe, resilient human settlements and accommodation; understanding the complexities of place; respecting older people's decisions and lifestyle choices; protecting those who are most vulnerable; and promoting inclusion and contribution to community life.

Workplaces, Policies & Practice

Research helping to prevent poverty by contributing to the development of equitable, flexible retirement and pension policies; promoting lifelong learning. Supporting older workers in acquiring or adapting skills and knowledge to continue to work or become olderpreneurs; recognising inequities associated with extending working lives.

TECHNOLOGY, ENGINEERING & THE DIGITAL ECONOMY Research on medical devices, assistive technologies, monitored mobility to provide solutions to match social, psychological and service needs and aspirations of older people, their families and whānau. Understanding the potential and limitations of digital technologies, including digital equity.

ARCHITECTURE, CREATIVE ARTS & DESIGN Research on design improving products and environments that impact the health and well-being of older people. Using arts-based research methods to generate research, to challenge assumptions (e.g. ageism), and share knowledge with communities

EQUITY, INCLUSION & FUTURE GENERATIONS Research informed by Human Rights that acknowledges, values and responds to differences with regard to age, income, socio-economic class, health literacy, race, culture, ethnicity, gender, physical and mental abilities, sexual orientation and religion or spiritual practice; taking into account oppression, privilege, structural policies and institutions that perpetuate inequities. Intergenerational research and attitudes towards ageing of future generations.

Selection criteria

In addition to meeting the Doctoral Entry Requirements, potential Candidates will be selected based on the extent to which their statement of research intent describes

- Co-created research: actively **involving** older people
- Transdisciplinary research: spanning more than one discipline and aligned to one or more of research themes
- Research that embeds equity, diversity or inclusion

We aim to support at least one scholarship per year from Māori or Pacific applicants to reflect our strategic goal to encourage the growth of Indigenous knowledge and research capacity.

We will prioritise applicants who

- are already engaged with the communities that they propose to work with
- have experience in co-creation or community-based work

The Strategic Management Team for CCREATE-AGE comprises representatives from all faculties in the University of Auckland (Medical and Health Sciences, Science, Engineering, Arts, Creative Arts and Industries, Education and Social Work, Law, Business School, Liggins Institute and Auckland Bioengineering Institute) and representatives of business and industry; government and public sector; and civil society. We strongly encourage PhD candidates to contact CCREATE-AGE so that the Strategic Management Team can facilitate the identification of a potential transdisciplinary supervisory team to support the candidate to write a Statement of Research Intent, on occasions when the PhD candidate has not already identified potential supervisors.

The Strategic Management Team will rank statements of research intent based on the quality of the applications and the criteria above.

Successful PhD scholars will join a vibrant community of co-creators and will be supported in a safe and innovative place to learn. Your research will have an influential impact on health, environment, society and science.





Notes to the applicant:

- Supervisor involvement in the development of the Statement of Research Intent is strongly advised. Contact your proposed supervisor(s) well in advance of the closing date for applications. Applicants may email <u>CCREATEAGE@auckland.ac.nz</u> for advice about finding appropriate supervisors.
- You must get endorsement of the Statement of Research Intent from your proposed supervisor if you wish to be considered for a CCREATE-AGE University of Auckland Doctoral Scholarship. - In addition to endorsing the Statement of Research Intent, your proposed supervisorsmust provide a letter briefly detailing the quality of the supervisory environment, including:
 - The training, background, and track record of each member of the supervisory team.
 - The role of each member in the supervisory team.
 - The approximate percentage workload (out of 100%) that each member will contribute to the candidate's supervision, in accordance with the allowed supervision models.
 - The frequency with which candidate and supervisor(s) will meet and the mode of meeting.
 - The transdisciplinary nature of the supervisory team.
