Description

The Prize was established in 2024 and is funded by law firm Mayne Wetherell.

The main purpose of the Prize is to reward and recognise academic excellence in Part I of a Bachelor of Laws degree.

Selection process

- Nomination is made to the Scholarships Office
- The Prize is awarded by the University of Auckland Council on the recommendation of the Dean of the Faculty of Law (or nominee)

Regulations

- 1. The Prize will be known as the Mayne Wetherell Prize.
- 2. One Prize will be awarded annually and will be of the value of \$1,500.
- 3. The Prize will be awarded to the student enrolled in a Bachelor of Laws (LLB) or LLB conjoint degree who achieved the highest grade point average (GPA) across LAW 121G, LAW 131 and LAW 141 (see Notes I and II). As a minimum standard, the student must have achieved a GPA of at least 7.00 (equivalent to an A- average) across the three courses. If more than two students achieved the same GPA, the Prize may be awarded to the student who achieved the highest weighted average marks.
- 4. Students who have repeated one or more of the courses will not be eligible for a Prize.
- 5. The Prize will be awarded by the University of Auckland Council on the recommendation of the Dean of the Faculty of Law (or nominee).
- 6. In the event of a tie, the Dean of the Faculty of Law (or nominee) will determine whether a Prize may be shared.
- 7. The University of Auckland Council is not obliged to make an award if it is determined there is no candidate that meets the criteria and/or no candidate of sufficient merit.
- 8. The University of Auckland Council can amend or vary these regulations provided that there is no departure from the main purpose of the Prize.
- 9. Notes [I]-[II] below are deemed to be Regulations.

Notes

- I. GPA calculations will be undertaken after results for LAW 131 and LAW 141 are available each year.
- II. The three courses are not required to be undertaken in the same year.
- III. These regulations are subject to Senate and Council approval.
