## Description

The Robert Riddell Heritage Prize was established in 2016 by Professor Emeritus Robert Riddell.

The main purpose of the Prize is to recognise the student who produced the best work in the field of heritage in the School of Architecture and Planning in an academic year. Heritage is understood to encompass the natural and cultural, and the awarded work will reinforce an understanding of its importance and how it can be preserved and conserved.

## **Selection process**

- Nomination is made to the Scholarships Office.
- The Prize will be awarded by the University of Auckland Council on the recommendation of the Head of the School of Architecture and Planning

## Regulations

- 1. The Prize will be known as the Robert Riddell Heritage Prize.
- 2. One Prize will be awarded annually and will be of the value of \$1,000.
- 3. The Prize will be awarded annually to the student who achieved the highest mark in either URBPLAN 722 Heritage/Cultural Issues or HERCONS 700 Heritage Process, or an equivalent course, and who demonstrates an understanding of heritage and advances its preservation and conservation, as evidenced in the student's coursework and tutorial participation.
- 4. The Prize will be awarded by the University of Auckland Council on the recommendation of the Head of the School of Architecture and Planning (or nominee).
- 5. In the event of a tie, the Head of the School of Architecture and Planning will determine, in consultation with the Programme Director of Urban Planning, if the Prize may be shared.
- 6. The University of Auckland Council is not obliged to make an award if it is determined there is no candidate that meets the criteria and/or no candidate of sufficient merit.
- 7. The University of Auckland Council can amend or vary these regulations provided that there is no departure from the main purpose of the Prize.
