

Graduate Destination Survey 2023



2023 Graduate Destination Survey Findings

Waipapa Taumata Rau, the University of Auckland's fifth Graduate Destination Survey (GDS) was launched on the 3rd of November 2023, and continues to operate annually. Graduates who completed their qualifications between March 2022 and February 2023 were invited to participate in the survey. An overall response rate of 24% (2022: 22%, 2021: 24%, 2019: 25%, 2017: 22%) was achieved.

Employment

In 2023, the employment rate of GDS respondents remained high and in line with previous year's 96% (2022: 97%, 2021: 97%, 2019: 96%, 2017: 95%).

The employment rate in GDS 2023 has dropped to 94% for respondents with an undergraduate-level degree (2022: 96%), whereas the employment rate for respondents with a postgraduate-level degree increases to 98% (2022: 97%).

The median salary reported by the 2023 GDS respondents is identical to those reported in 2022 & 2021 (NZD 60,000 - 69,999 level), compared to that of NZD 50,000 - 60,000 in the 2019 and 2017 surveys.

Further Study

Among the 2023 respondents, 20% were undertaking further study at the time of the survey (2022: 21%, 2021: 21%, 2019: 24%, 2017: 24%). Among these graduates, more than 64% were doing non-doctoral postgraduate courses (2022: 65%) and 16% doctoral degrees (2022: 19%). Furthermore, 65% of respondents who continued to study have re-enrolled with the University of Auckland (2022: 72%). 'To improve my career options' (32%; 2022: 38%) and 'enhance my knowledge in my specialist field' (24%; 2022: 24%) remained the most popular main reasons for taking up further study.

Programme Satisfaction and University Experience

Among our 2023 respondents, the vast majority considered their programmes of study at the University of Auckland had contributed to their personal development (92%; 2022: 92%), gave them a broad overview of their subject area field (90%; 2022: 90%), was worthwhile (89%; 2022: 89%), was making a positive contribution to society (83%; 2022: 83%), and helped them develop skills that are useful in the workplace (76%; 2022: 77%).

Respondents also indicated their programmes helped them develop skills in finding information and using it effectively (91%; 2022: 89%), problem-solving (88%; 2022: 86%), written communication (88%; 2022: 89%), spoken communication (76%; 2022: 76%), and working with others (78%; 2022: 77%).

Across all programme levels 85% of respondents (2022: 90%) said their education at the University of Auckland helped develop skills in research and data analysis (Undergraduate: 82%, Postgraduate: 86%, Doctoral: 98%), and 74% (2022: 78%) were satisfied with the supervision they received (Undergraduate: 65%, Postgraduate: 81%, Doctorate: 88%).

Doctoral graduates' feedback

Since 2021, the GDS was expanded to include our doctoral graduates with questions specifically designed to understand this cohort. Within one year of completing their doctorate degree, 93% of GDS 2023 respondents were working full-time or part-time (2022: 90%). Among those in the workforce, 70% (2022: 65%) at the time of the survey were already either working in an academic position (27%; 2022: 21%), a post-doctoral fellowship or scholarship (21%; 2022: 22%), or in paid employment related to their doctorate (21%; 2022: 22%).
