





Dear Craccum,

For all those who wondered what WomensFest was about, and why it happened, here is a summary of the week's achievements:

150 women now have information on health issues such as cervical and breast cancer and contraception. All women who visited the quad during the week were able to pick up info on Auckland support services for women. 50 women participated in yoga classes that taught practical exercises for such things as releasing shoulder tension, and dealing with period pain. 20 women are now better equipped, both physically and psychologically, to defend themselves if attacked. 15 women had the opportunity to develop their writing skills, and to take away tools to continue this development. 30 women were empowered by listening to each other read their poetry, and a number were inspired to continue this further into forming a women's writing forum. 20 women experienced inspiring and empowering meditation exercises. 50 women had the chance to meet informally and eat lunch together. 60 women enjoyed trying natural healing practices such as massage, aromatherapy, shiatsu, back reading and channelling, and many expressed an intention to continue such self-nurturing in their lives. 10 women met to discuss issues for queer women on campus, and how these needs may be met. 10 women explored voice and rhythm in a fulfilling workshop. Several women discussed rape and abuse issues with a rape crisis worker, in a safe environment. Hundreds of students were able to enjoy entertainment such as Teremoana Rapley and Mary. 5000 people were able to read about important issues related to women, and to appreciate creative work from Auckland Uni women, in the form of Chimera, the women's publication.



REMEMBER TO ENROL FOR LOCAL AUTHORITY ELECTIONS

Do you want to have your say in the local authority elections later this year? Then you need to be enrolled to vote - and you need to be listed at your current postal address to receive a voting pack.

New Zealand Post's Electoral Enrolment Centre (EEC) National Manager, Murray Wicks, said that the EEC will be targetting people in the 18-29 years age group who have traditionally been the hardest to encourage to enrol.

"During last year's Compulsory Retirement Savings Referendum, more than half of the unenrolled voters came from this group. And only 83% of eligible voters in this group enrolled, compared with 93% of all age groups combined. As the elections will affect the communities we all live in, we're encouraging as many young people, as well as other eligible electors, to ensure they are enrolled in order to have their say."

Why don't more young people enrol?

Feedback Murray Wicks has received shows that we're interested in voting but just don't get around to enrolling.

Enrolling is a quick and easy exercise. Enrolment forms are available at Post Shops and can be completed on the spot. Alternatively, forms can be requested by phoning 0800 ENROL NOW (0800 367 656).

Mr Wicks said this year's campaign gets underway from 20 July when all registered electors will be sent a personalised enrolment update pack to check to ensure their details are correct. When you receive the pack, check your details are correct and only return the enclosed coupon if your details need changing.

If you don't receive a pack then call 0800 ENROL NOW (0800 367 656). The last day you can make changes or enrol is 28 August. If you've moved flats since last year's Referendum then you will also need to complete a change of address request so you can receive your voting papers.

Differentiated fees "spineless"

Tuition fees will rise by as much as 60% next year

A decision by the University to implement a differentiated tuition fee structure for 1999 has met with strong opposition from students.

Last Monday's council meeting voted 15-3 in favour of accepting the Finance committee's recommendation and endorsing differentiated fees in principle.

Exact fee levels will not be set until October, but it is expected that medicine, engineering and fine arts students - the socalled 'high cost' degrees - will pay up to 60 per cent more. Arts, commerce and law degrees are facing an increase of \$800 to \$1000.

The decision is "spineless and immoral," according to AUSA President Mark O'Brien. He claims the University is more interested in serving the interests of "big business" than the students.

Students are concerned about the "mammoth" amount of debt they are going to incur, said O'Brien. It is estimated that under differentiated fees the average student loan debt of medicine students will jump to nearly \$60,000. "Student's struggle enough already," he said. Higher tuition fees will "restrict student's choices."

Those council members in favour of differentiated fees argued it was unfair that students pursing less expensive courses of study should subsidise the more expensive ones, but some University staff expressed concern that higher tuition fees for some degrees would significantly restrict access to students from lower socio-economic backgrounds.

Alistair Vice-Chancellor Acting MacCormick said the University had been forced to consider charging students more because it's main source of income, Government funding, had been significantly cut.

When asked why the AUSA Executive had not run a visible campaign against differentiated fees, as it did in 1997, O'Brien blamed Graham Watson. He claims the "internal politics" perpetuated by Watson "hamstrung" Exec and prevented them from mounting concerted campaign action.

"Graham Watson takes up a lot of time," he said.

A march is planned, however, for this Thursday, to demand a "fees freeze." University is not "for those who can afford it and the rest can sod off," said O'Brien.

PC-ness killing academic freedom

Universities 'islands of repression' says Business Roundtable leader

The leader of the Business Roundtable challenged the public to question the traditional concept of "academic freedom" in a guest lecture last week.

Roger Kerr, one of New Zealand's most well-known businesspeople and Executive Director of the BRT, spoke to a full house at the Maidment Theatre last Tuesday in the last of the 1998 Winter Lecture Series - "The University in the 21st Century."

Kerr suggested that the greatest threat to academic freedom was not corporate involvement or privatisation but political correctness.

The problem with political correctness is not, he argued, "the content of the opinions involved," but "that they are held so selfrighteously - criticism of them is denounced and silenced rather than answered."

He was critical of the lack of public academic debate, and stated "things have come to a pretty pass if academics to whom we grant academic freedom... are not prepared to exercise it." As a consequence universities risk becoming "islands of repression in a sea of freedom.'

Kerr cited the Tertiary Education Review 1997, released by the Ministry of Education, which defined 'academic freedom' as "the role of academic staff to act as critic and conscience of society."

The review stated that the Government should use the Crown's ownership interests in tertiary institutions to "ensure protection of the tradition of academic freedom." But, Kerr argued, academic freedom is not selfevident and is up for interpretation in differing situations.

He informed the audience that he takes a sceptical view of the association between academic freedom and a university's role as 'critic and conscience of society."

He questioned the protection of academic freedom by the Education Act and asked, "why should academic freedom be singled out for special statuary protection?" He believes this is "faintly totalitarian" and would like to see the Act repealed so that universities can experience "enhanced accountability." He maintains this would not threaten academic freedom.

The Tertiary Education Review's defini-

tion of the role of universities in society promotes them as "fragile beacons of enlightenment, defending truth and reason from the forces of mass bigotry and ignorance." While this may be flattering to academics, he said, "it is, I submit, nonsense."

He danced around questions from some audience members who clearly disagreed with his politics. "This is not really the forum for that kind of question," he said in response to one angry elderly woman who said business leaders like Kerr had done nothing for the nation's poor.

Questioned about the privatisation of tertiary education, he assured the audience that many universities around the world are non-profit, with no income returned to the shareholders. However, profit-making should not be ruled out, he argued, because there could be "benefits."

"Even Karl Marx believed that government should have no role in the direct provision of education."

Fighting and bickering mars first meeting for new members

A handful of new Executive members were treated to an acrimonious first meeting last Monday as their more experienced colleagues began arguing the familiar subject of Graham Watson's ban.

Treasurer Chris Patch put forward a motion proposing a 'working party' to discuss solutions for resolving the conflict between Watson and the current Exec and the possibility of lifting the ban on him entering AUSA headquarters.

Watson has been elected to the 1999 Executive as SRC Chair. Patch argued that "antagonistic dealings need to be sorted out as soon as possible so we can all work together collectively against VSM... We can't leave next year's Exec with this lega-

Administrative Vice-President Larissa Wakim agreed with the principle of presenting a united front, but was strongly against lifting the ban. "We should stick to the resolution that this year's Exec has made." She pointed out that Watson sat on last year's Exec while banned. "We should work together against VSM, but that has nothing with Graham Watson's ban."

Watson told the Exec it was "time to bury the hatchet" and to "let me start getting on with my job. I want to establish a working relationship with next year's Exec and staff members." He criticised those who wanted to maintain the ban as possessing a "hard-line, hard-nosed attitude."

Education Vice-President Sarah Lee was angered by Watson's comments. "I'm not inclined to leap up and down and make up with Graham. All year he's been constantly attacking us... it doesn't look to me like you want to work with us," she said.

"Maybe he's changed," said Overseas Student's Officer Yashoda Patel. "No-one's asking for the ban to be lifted," said Tamaki Representative Hamish Norrie. "It's just a bit of constructive conversation" - sentiments echoed by Media Officer Mark Van Zon and new International Affairs Officer Brian Stanney.

Pacific Island Student's Representative and President-elect Efeso Collins seconded the motion but withdrew it when Watson stormed out of the room swearing and threatening that he would violate the ban regardless of Exec's decision. "Fuck it," Watson said. "If you want to fight, let's fight." He returned to the meeting ten minutes later reiterating his earlier threats. "I'll be at 4 Alfred Street at nine o'clock tomorrow morning."

The meeting at one stage fell into personal bickering between Exec members. Co-Media Officer Karl Bartleet criticised Patch for "springing this on us when you know it's so controversial... you know there's about seventy other things on the fucking agenda." Patch responded by saying "I'm only trying to set up a working party, Shaggy... I'm disappointed in you." Lee then exchanged sour words with Patch, referring to him as "the most incredibly rude person I know."

It was an inauspicious beginning to student politics for International Affairs Officers Stanney and Darryl Godfrey, Environmental Affairs Officer Phoebe Fletcher, and Clubs and Societies Representative Kane Stanford - all of whom were elected in a by-election held simultaneously with the portfolio elections last week.

Several vacancies were created on the current Exec because some members failed to attend the required number of meetings and lapsed; one other member resigned.










Things That Make You Throw Stones.

Many Good Reasons for Taking it to the Streets - Thurs 1pm



Think back to late 1997. A motion that a differential fee structure be adopted for the 1998 academic year is defeated by the casting vote of Chancellor Ian Barker at a council meeting. This time around, the differential fee advocates have been busy lobbying those counsellors who voted against the differential fee structure last year. Sadly, the only three people last Monday who voted against adopting a differential fee structure in principal for 1999 were the student reps and a representative from Med School. The differential fee advocates may

have won the battle, but they have not yet won the war.

The war on fees will be fought by those of you who take to the streets on Thursday when, as a part of a National Week of Action, Auckland students will push for Council to Freeze the Fees. This time a major fee rise of at least \$700 is imminent. The University is strapped for cash and differential fees are the easiest way to milk some money from students. This means, as one University council member said, "students will suffer for their institution".



The Council knows that in some courses such as Medicine, Engineering, and Architecture there will always be a high demand places. So, no matter what the price they are guaranteed students. But what will the make up of these courses be? The rich will pay, no matter what the cost. The middle class will struggle to make ends meet. But what about the poor? Chances are that people on lower incomes, who are already under represented in "high demand" courses will continue to fall. So to make themselves feel heter about ignoring the recently released Equal Educational Opportunities Report which states that fees are a barrier to educan, the University Council is "investigating" some token scholarships for these students. This is a vain attempt to cover up the fact

that under a differential fee structure, access to high demand courses is based on income and not ability.



For those of you in 'lower cost' courses such as the Arts and Commerce, differentiated fees will not mean that you will pay less. What it means is that everyone's fees will go up - some by a few hundred and some by a few thousand. Furthermore, everyone will pay in the long run. Med. students already owe an average of \$25,000 (compared to an average of \$10,800 nationwide). If a differentiated fee is introduced Med. students are likely to pay up to \$9,000 a year, and will have debts closer to \$100,000 (as seen at Otago where fees are differentiated already). In the long run it will be we, as New Zealanders, who will be paying off their debt in astronomical doctors' bills. We will also have doctors who will have their qualification based on the fact that they had a bigger bank balance, not on their ability. Is this what we want for our future?

The University Council are sitting there and taking each funding cut as it comes. Why are they not standing up for our institution and for their students? Universities are supposed to be the "critic and conscience of society" according to the Education Act, so why won't our Council show some guts and criticise what's going on instead of passing each funding decrease onto us - Generation Debt. We already owe over \$2.7 billion and it is time for Council to stop seeing students as Cash Cows, a form of revenue which they can milk any time they're short of income. As Acting Vice Chancellor Alistair MacCormick stated, it doesn't matter how high fees are, because students can just borrow the money. Never mind the fact that we're going to be buried under tens of thousands of dollars of debt for the rest of our lives. It is time for the Council to rise to the challenge and recognise students as human beings, not as income generating units. The time has come for us to make them listen.

These concerns are not exclusive to Auckland University. All public tertiary institutions are looking down the barrel of significant fee increases. Which is why students from other institutions have been invited along on Thursday's march. How much of an impact we make on Thursday is up to each individual. For those of you who remain in the Quad, you have supported these fee increases through inaction. For the students who take to take the message of a fee freeze to the streets there is a character to the streets. of a fee freeze to the streets, there is a chance to make a difference.

First impressions count, and when the VIP tickets arrived the gold sheen certainly promised a class event. The Feelers came on to green smoke and smacked us collectively across the ears with a hard angst-ridden Bush-style song The crowd called Friend. acclaimed loudly.






