### **Ethics Guidelines for Conducting Research with Human Participants**

We are invited to offer feedback on the University's new "Ethical Guidelines for Conducting Research with Human Participants", developed as part of the Research Ethics Improvement Plan. The feedback form is open until 25 July 2025, and both staff and students can participate. More information is available <a href="here">here</a>, including the link to the form. An additional update on this:

Jointly with colleagues from the Faculty of Arts and Education, I made a submission to the Pro Vice-Chancellor Global and Graduate Research and one of the Associate Directors of the Research and Innovation Office, explaining why the current ethics approval and renewal process does not work for many, if not most, researchers in our respective faculties. Prof Karen Fernandez was also part of the group in her then role as Associate Dean (Postgraduate Research). The submission included an unambiguously worded memo, supplemented by two previous ones sent to the two different Deputy Vice-Chancellors (Research) at the time (from the former Faculty of Education and Social Work in 2012 and me in 2020). We also included three publications on research ethics by members of our group to argue our case. I am happy to share the documents on request.

A meeting with the parties involved took place 3 July. It was a productive one, reigniting the hope for a resolution after a long battle for making ethics-related processes in our university actually work for us.

### The Royal Society NZ launches best-practice guidelines for using GenAI in research

Researchers urged to take 'critical approach' to using Al - A set of guidelines issued in June this year by the Royal Society Te Apārangi outlines the way the emerging technology might impact researchers' work. The guidelines warn of "cultural limitations, bias, hallucinations, and inaccuracies of generative Al" and stress that responsibility for outputs lies with human researchers.

### From the Mid-Career Researchers Taskforce

After the success of our previous writing retreats and based on feedback we gathered during and after them, the Mid-Career Researchers (MCR) Taskforce is pleased to announce the 2025 writing retreat. It will be a three-day/two-night event for 10 MCRs. Funded by the Faculty Research Committee, it will take place 19-21 November at Waitakere Resort, in Waiatarua, West Auckland. Participants need to commit to the full, uninterrupted duration of the retreat and specify in advance their objective(s). A pre-dinner speaker on sustaining writing and a roundtable discussion on writing productivity techniques will provide further insights and an opportunity for networking among MCRs.

If you have a research component in your contract and see yourself as an MCR, you are eligible to apply. Please email <u>Dr Dan Tisch</u> with your name, department, a statement confirming that you commit to participating in the full event, and your writing provisional objective(s).

## Research Development Fund 2026 - contestable round

Applications to the Research Development Fund (RDF) contestable round for projects starting in 2026 are now open. The deadlines for sending applications to the respective Disciplinary Area Lead is 3 October, 5pm and for submitting the final application is 17 October, 5pm.

- We are inviting applications for funding of 1-year projects with budgets of up to \$15,000.
- Project accounts will be active from 1 January 2026, and the funds must be utilised by 31 December 2026 at the latest.
- Following the UoA guidelines, applications for workload relief and teaching buyout will not be considered.

## Juncture Research Fund 2026: Call for proposals

The Juncture Research Fund (JRF) 2026 is now open for applications for collaborative, impactful research projects. There is no upper limit to the funding, and research may be funded for up to three years. Projects should challenge core assumptions about business and capitalism and explore how they can evolve to enhance the wellbeing of people and the planet.
