#### **Faculty Research Excellence Awards**

We have received 17 applications for this year's Faculty Research Excellence Awards, an increase from the 15 last year. The winners will be announced at the Business School Excellence Awards event on 7 August.

#### A new Research Beacon

The new Research Beacon Urban Analytics and City Science Research Beacon joins our other two Beacons - Health & Wellbeing and Circular Economy in Business. The Research Beacon will focus on transforming urban policymaking through datadriven innovation and cross-sector collaboration. By harnessing geospatial analytics, mobile big data, and urban modelling, the Beacon plans to deliver actionable insights into housing affordability, green space access, and sustainability. With strong international partnerships and a commitment to cultural integration, including Indigenous frameworks like the Kaupapa Māori Urban Form Assessment, the Beacon intends to conduct and disseminate research that contributes to inclusive,

resilient, and sustainable urban futures.
The new Beacon will be led by Assoc Professors William Cheung and Edward Yiu (both from the Department of Property). Other members of the leadership team are from the Faculty of Engineering and Design and the Faculty of Science.
