### **Aotearoa Business and Economics Research Translation Competition 2025**

This year, the Competition (a collaboration among the eight Business Schools in New Zealand) will be coordinated and led by the AUT's Faculty of Business, Economics and Law. Our Business School took the lead in organising this competition in 2019, 2020/2021, and 2023; last year, it was the University of Canterbury Business School.

# **ABDC Journal Quality List review 2025**

The step that has now been completed in the review process is the submission of Expressions of Interest (EoI) to serve on the review panels. The ABDC received 143 EoIs, 19 of which were from NZ Business Schools. Out of the 19, six were from our faculty, three from Victoria University of Wellington and the University of Waikato (each), two from the University of Canterbury and Lincoln University (each), and one from Auckland University of Technology, Massey University, and Otago University (each). From our Business School, three EoIs were from ISOM, two from A&F, and one from PROP. Prof Julia Kotlarsky (ISOM) has been selected to chair the Information Systems panel. She is the only NZ scholar to chair a panel; the other nine Chairs are from Australian Business Schools

# From the Mid-Career Researchers' Taskforce

For many MCRs, the notion of crafting their career can feel like a double-edged sword. The freedom and flexibility can be empowering, but the ambiguity can lead to feeling squeezed by too many competing commitments.

We held our first interactive session exploring this issue: *Managing Work-Life Challenges for Mid-Career Researchers*. Many thanks to the panelists Lina El-Jahel, Mike Lee, Billie Lythberg, and Fred Ng, who shared the following thoughts to consider:

- 1. What is one small thing you can do to set a boundary between your work and off time? What do you want work and off time to look like?
- 2. What does it mean to you to 'be productive', and where does the idea come from? The nature of work has changed since the Industrial Revolution!
- 3. In your current phase of life and career, what would *you* like to prioritise? What priorities might you be holding on to that belonged to a different phase?
- 4. How much time do you take to think strategically about what to spend your time on at work? Would you want to spend just a bit more time to think strategically about it?

Interested in doing more to craft your career? The Mid-Career Researcher Development Programme is a place to reflect on common MCR challenges, with guiding activities in a supportive space. There are two spaces still available. The format is an off-site intensive from 1-3 September, followed by four workshops on 17 September, 1 October, 15 October, and 29 October, all 2 – 4 pm.

#### **Predatory publishing**

A new resource on ResearchHub offers advice on predatory journal publishers and conference organisers. It includes guidance on assessing the quality of journals and conferences and the red flags to look out for.
