Hi all,

Welcome to the first ADR Update for 2023!

Thank you to Prof Rod McNaughton for stepping in as Acting Associate Dean Research and Acting Associate Dean PBRF in the second half of last year while I was on RSL.

Faculty Research Committee and Early Career Researchers' Committee

There are a few changes to the membership of the <u>Faculty Research Committee</u> and the <u>Early Career Researcher Committee</u> in 2023. Congratulations to Dr Mahdi Mahmoudzadeh (ISOM) who has been elected by the ECRC to the Chair role and thank you to outgoing Chair, Dr Grigorij Ljubownikow (MIB), for his leadership of ECRC over the last two years. I appreciate the work of the two committees' members in 2022 and welcome our new members.

Our two priorities for 2023

Mid-career researchers (MCRs) comprise approximately 45% of research staff in the Business School. Supporting their development will be among our research priorities. Prof Emeritus Rod Brodie and Dr Lisa Callagher (MIB) conducted a series of MCR focus groups last year and are currently analysing the results. This analysis, along with input from the literature on MCRs, will inform the development of designated MCR development initiatives throughout 2023 and beyond.

Our other priority this year will be our Research Centres and Research Beacons. The Research Centres have now operated for a year under the relatively new university policy in that space. We intend to do more work to utilise the opportunities these Centres and Beacons in the Business School offer.

Successes to celebrate

MBIE Endeavour success

The Faculty's success in the 2022 MBIE Endeavour round was pointed out last year; here I would like to congratulate the following researchers for their cross-institutional collaborations and MBIE funding success:

- Assoc Prof Julia Fehrer (MIB) for the project titled "Shaping a circular market system for plastics in New Zealand" that was awarded \$11.7 million.
- Prof Kenneth Husted and Dr Yat Ming Ooi (both MIB) for the project titled "Developing a Construction 4.0 transformation of Aotearoa New Zealand's construction sector" that was awarded \$10.3 million.
- Prof Emeritus Basil Sharp, Dr Selena Sheng, and Dr Len Wen from the Energy Centre (Economics) for the project titled "Sustainable biomass-derived materials to replace bitumen for transport infrastructure" that was awarded \$9.1 million.

Transdisciplinary Ideation Funding awarded late 2022

24 submissions from across the University were made in the latest round; 12 received funding and a further five applications received conditional funding to support the proposed research.

- Dr Kiri Dell and Prof Kenneth Husted (both MIB) are Associate Investigators on "Huri Rawa, Huri Rauna: Māori-Led Circular Economy" that was awarded \$60,000 with co-investigators from the Faculties of Engineering and Science.
- Dr Brent Burmeister (MIB) was awarded \$20,000 of conditional funding for his project "Delimiting Datafication: Extending Al Auditing to Training-Data Appropriation" with colleagues from the Faculties of Creative Arts and Industries and Science. This is Brent's 2nd TIF grant.

Internal funding

Funding for the following initiatives is available again this year from our non-contestable research development fund (RDF):

- Editing support for journal (re)submissions
- Research Assistant support

The application forms can be found here. Once the form is completed, please contact Juan Rodriguez. For approved applications, please submit any invoices as soon as the service is completed. Please remember that timesheets for payment should be submitted monthly; this will help with the forecast and efficient utilisation of our available funds. As communicated in the past, researchers with positive balances in either a Research Development Account or a Personal Research Account will be expected to use the funds in these accounts before applying for RDF money.

Open Access publishing agreements

These agreements with scholarly publishers allow researchers to publish their work without incurring the (often significant) article processing charges/publication fees and seek to increase the number of open access articles published in scholarly journals. UoA has 15 Open Access publishing agreements available to affiliated researchers for the duration of 2023. You can read more about this and view the list of publisher agreements on Research Hub.

Social Sciences Research Network (SSRN)

In 2022, we continued to upload recent research papers and/or abstracts to the <u>University of Auckland Business School Research Paper Series (RPS)</u> that now includes 1,062 UABS papers/abstracts. There have been 61,945 downloads and 375,109 abstract views to date.

Five researchers from our Faculty are submitting Marsden EoIs this year — one for the Fast-Start round, and four for the Standard round. We wish the applicants well as they complete the final submission and for the review process. Outcomes and invitations to submit full proposals will be announced on 9 May.
