An all-day forum which will present research on and debate recent and proposed reforms to New Zealand's social support system. These include:

- Changes to hardship provisions, including the phasing out of the Special Benefit;
- The introduction of the Working for Families family assistance package;
- The proposed 'work-first' approach which extends employment-focused assistance to clients regardless of their benefit type;
- The proposed replacement of existing working age benefits with a single benefit designed around outcomes.

Invited speakers will place these changes in an historical and international context, as well as provide evidence of their actual or likely impact upon low income families, lone parents and people with disabilities.

A panel discussion at the end of the day will allow for broader debate about the future of welfare in Zealand.
