



Multiple Mini Interview tips

- If you have a disability and would like to request a reasonable accommodation, please make sure you complete the [required form](#) by the 1st of July deadline.
- Once you start the interview, you will not be able to pause or re-record your responses.
- Dress appropriately, even though it is a video recording, this is still a professional interview.
- Look directly into the camera when possible and speak clearly.
- Make sure you have photo ID with you to show to the camera. You should have both your primary ID and your secondary ID with you. For a list of acceptable primary and secondary IDs please see the [MMI Interviewee FAQ](#) page.
- Each station will begin with a video of the scenario being read aloud to you. The scenario will also be displayed in text format underneath the video. The scenario text will remain displayed on the screen for you to refer to as you record your response.
- After you have watched the video of the scenario being read, you will have 30 seconds of preparation time. During this 30 seconds, you are permitted to make handwritten notes on paper.
- After the preparation time, you then have three minutes to record your response to the scenario. You will see a timer at the top of the screen showing you the time that you have remaining. Aim to give an answer that uses up the full three minutes. Try to bring your thoughts to a close before the timer is up to avoid being cut off mid-sentence.
- The reviewers will recognise that you've only had 30 seconds to think about the scenario so they are not expecting you to cover everything, they are looking for your ability to think on your feet.
- In some scenarios, reviewers are wanting to see that you can recognise an issue as being debatable and can see arguments on both sides.
- Remember that you are not being judged on the "rightness" or "wrongness" of your answer. You and the reviewer will each have a personal point of view. It is quite possible that you and the reviewer will perceive the issue differently, but you will be scored on the way you discuss the scenario, form your opinion, and articulate it. You will not be scored on your views/beliefs.
- If you find yourself changing your mind about the issue during the interview, don't be afraid to say so. Being prepared to shift your position shows that you are open to change and can be flexible in your thinking.
- You are not required to share an experience that is upsetting or distressing. Consider carefully the experiences you feel comfortable sharing during this interview.
