












Mahuta ake i te pae | Designing Our Constitution 2024 is a conference being held in memory of Dr Moana Jackson, and to continue the conversations sparked through his work on the landmark report of Matike Mai Aotearoa.


Building on those conversations, this conference is focused on identifying practical steps towards designing an inclusive constitution for Aotearoa based on tikanga and kawa, He Whakaputanga, Te Tiriti o Waitangi and human rights.

Day 1 of the conference is focused on actions within the tino rangatiratanga sphere, while the second day looks also to the relational and kāwanatanga spheres, with a focus on inclusion. The programme includes speakers, panel discussions and opportunities for discussion through group workshops.

The key outcomes sought from the conference are some clear, concrete actions that individuals, groups, whānau, hapū, iwi, organisations and communities can consider, discuss, build support around or implement themselves.

The report of *Matike Mai Aotearoa* provides the foundation for these discussions.[1]. That report discussed: the nature, foundations and values of a constitution, translated these into a vision for constitutional transformation, and offered some potential constitutional models.

While wanting to be grounded in that mahi, this conference seeks to move discussions into the practical detail of making change happen. Each session is themed after specific values discussed in the *Matike Mai* report. The conference will consider how these values can be practically implemented through an inclusive, Te Tiriti-based constitution.



A HUI IN MEMORY OF DR MOANA JACKSON HONOURING HIS WORK AND LEGACY

Constitutional values

as summarised in the report of Matike Mai Aotearoa

- 1. The value of tikanga that is the need for a constitution to relate to or incorporate the core ideals and the "ought to be" of living in Aotearoa.
- 2. The value of community that is the need for a constitution to facilitate the fair representation and good relationships between all peoples.
- **3. The value of belonging** that is the need for a constitution to foster a sense of belonging for everyone in the community.
- **4. The value of place** that is the need for a constitution to promote relationships with, and ensure the protection of Papatūānuku.
- **5.** The value of balance that is the need for a constitution to ensure respect for the authority of rangatiratanga and kāwanatanga within the different and relational spheres of influence.
- **6.** The value of conciliation that is the need for a constitution to have an underlying jurisdictional base and a means of resolution to guarantee a conciliatory and consensual democracy.
- **7. The value of structure** that is the need for a constitution to have structural conventions that promote basic democratic ideals of fair representation, openness and transparency.


