A Doctor of Philosophy (PhD) is a globally recognised postgraduate research degree and the highest academic degree you can achieve.

International doctoral candidates at the University of Auckland pay the same tuition fees as New Zealand doctoral candidates - just NZ\$8,347.202 or around US\$5.000.3

Employment opportunities

When you study in New Zealand as a full-time international PhD candidate, your visa will allow you to undertake paid work. On completing your PhD, you may apply for a three-year post-study work visa through Immigration New Zealand.

Family benefits

As a PhD candidate based in New Zealand, you can bring your family when you study. Your spouse or partner may apply for an open work visa valid for the same duration as your student visa.

How we support you

Domestic fee rates

New international PhD candidates who live in New Zealand during their doctoral study pay the same annual tuition fees as New Zealand students. In 2026 that is expected to be about US\$5,000 per annum (excluding compulsory fees).

Generous scholarships

A range of scholarship options are available for international PhD candidates, including country-specific funding provided by your home government and local agencies. The University of Auckland Doctoral Scholarships (UoADS) are also an option for all applicants. These are highly competitive and only available as part of the admission process.

CSC scholarship

This is offered by the Chinese Scholarship Council and provides a living allowance, economy return airfares, student visa fees, and the cost of health insurance for up to four years.

Automatic research funding

Research support funding is available automatically to all PhD candidates. Postgraduate Research Student Support (PReSS) is intended to cover research costs and contribute to research-related travel, conference attendance and research consumables.

Preparing to apply

Entry requirements

Acceptance on to the programme is subject to staff availability for supervision, and appropriate facilities. You must demonstrate an ability to research independently and possess a high level of theoretical understanding. You must also have completed a significant research project, dissertation or thesis during your qualifying degree. You can check your eligibility using our online calculator. All PhD candidates must have a GPE of 6.0 or

You will need an overall IELTS academic score equivalent.*

How to apply for a PhD at the University of Auckland

PhD applications may be submitted at any time and a PhD candidate can begin their studies on the first of any month of the year. While there is no application closing date, please note that many scholarships have closing dates. Applications can be submitted at any time, but if you wish to be considered for a University of Auckland Doctoral Scholarship (UoADS), note that there are four closing dates for applications. If you are awarded a UoADS, you would need to start on one of four start dates throughout the year. You cannot be awarded a UoADS if you already have a scholarship funded by a foreign government or agency. If you are not on a UoADS Scholarship, you can start in any month of the year.

You need to allow at least three months between submitting a completed application and receiving an offer of a place in the programme. Often it takes longer than three months. You can speed things up by:

- > Applying when you have completed your qualifying programme or are close to completion
- > Submitting all of the required documents in a timely fashion
- > Securing the support of a main supervisor before you begin your online application
- Making sure that your referees submit their references as soon as possible
- > Responding promptly to any requests for additional information, including revisions to your statement of research intent.

Step 2. Choose your area of interest

Decide on your potential research topic, then check our active research in that area by exploring:

- > Find a supervisor: profiles.auckland.ac.nz
- > Faculty and department websites

The support of a supervisor is strongly encouraged but it does not guarantee you a place in our programme. You should already be in touch with a proposed supervisor and have their agreement that you can name them in your application.



Step 3. Check application closing dates

- If you are applying for the Doctor of Clinical Psychology or Doctor of Education, see auckland.ac.nz/pg-closing-dates
- > For other doctoral programmes, you can submit an Application for Admission at any time.



Step 4. Prepare your documentation

You will need electronic copies of:

- > Undergraduate and Postgraduate academic transcripts
- > Initial Statement of Research Intent
- > Curriculum vitae (résumé)
- > English language test results
- Evidence of your prior research experience: thesis/dissertation and/or publications



Step 5. Apply online
