## Description

The Prize was established in 1987 by the Auckland Branch of the Royal Commonwealth Society, with the assistance of Associate Professor Gerald Seaman, in memory of the late Allwyn Charles Keys, Professor of French and Romance Philology and Head of Modern Languages.

## Selection process

- Nomination is made to the Scholarships Office
- The Prize is awarded by the University of Auckland Council on the recommendation of the Deputy Head (Academic) of the School of Cultures, Languages and Linguistics (or nominee)

## Regulations

1. The Prize will be known as the A C Keys Memorial Prize.
2. The Prize will be awarded annually and will be of the value of \$500.
3. To be eligible for Prize consideration, a candidate must i) be enrolled full-time in either Stage III of a Bachelor of Arts (BA) or BA conjoint degree, or a Bachelor of Arts (Honours) (BA(Hons)), and ii) have completed at least four courses in any two of the Romance Languages, French, Italian, Spanish or Portuguese (taught as part of Latin American Studies), above Stage I level.
4. The Prize will be awarded to the student who has demonstrated the highest commitment to the study of Romance Languages as assessed by grades and engagement in coursework, and the number of Romance Language courses undertaken above Stage I level.
5. The Prize will be awarded by the University of Auckland Council on the recommendation of the Deputy Head (Academic) of the School of Cultures, Languages and Linguistics (or nominee), in consultation with the Major/Specialisation Leaders for European Studies (or nominee).
6. The University of Auckland Council is not obliged to make an award if it is determined there is no candidate that meets the criteria and/or no candidate of sufficient merit. The University of Auckland Council may make an additional award later or add the income to the capital fund.
7. The Prize may not be shared.

8. The University of Auckland Council can amend or vary these regulations, in consultation with the Faculty of Arts and Education, provided that there is no departure from the main purpose of the Prize.
