

# Confucius Institute Chinese Award

## Description

The Award was established in 2016 by the University of Auckland Confucius Institute.

The main purpose of the Award is to assist students studying a Bachelor of Arts majoring in Chinese at Waipapa Taumata Rau, University of Auckland.

## Selection process

- Nomination is made to the Scholarships Office
- The Award is made by the University of Auckland Council on the recommendation of the Deputy Head (Academic) of the School of Cultures, Languages and Linguistics (or nominee)

## Regulations

1. The Award will be known as the Confucius Institute Chinese Award.
2. Two Awards will be made annually for a period of one year and will comprise a tuition fees credit for CHINESE 300 Advanced Modern Chinese 1 and/or CHINESE 301 Advanced Modern Chinese 2.
3. To be eligible for Award consideration, a candidate must i) be enrolled in a Bachelor of Arts (BA) or BA conjoint degree majoring/specialising in Chinese, or a Bachelor of Global Studies (BGlobalSt) or BGlobalSt conjoint degree with Chinese as the selected language, ii) have completed CHINESE 200 Intermediate Modern Chinese 1 and CHINESE 201 Intermediate Modern Chinese 2 in the preceding year, and iii) be enrolled in CHINESE 300 and/or CHINESE 301.
4. The Award will be made to the student who achieved the best grade point average (GPA) over CHINESE 200 and CHINESE 201 in the preceding year.
5. The Award will be made by the University of Auckland Council on the recommendation of the Deputy Head (Academic) of the School of Cultures, Languages and Linguistics (or nominee) in consultation with the Major/Specialisation Leader for Asian Studies (or nominee) and the Confucius Institute.
6. In the event of a tie, the Deputy Head (Academic) of the School of Cultures, Languages and Linguistics (or nominee) will determine, in consultation with the Confucius Institute, if the Award may be shared.

7. The Award will be paid as a tuition fees credit in Semester One and/or Two, as soon as is practical after confirmation of the awardee's enrolment (that is, after the final date on which a student may add or delete courses without incurring a late enrolment fee).
8. To be paid the Award, awardees must be enrolled in CHINESE 30 and/or CHINESE 301.
9. The Award may be held concurrently with any other scholarship, award or grant as long as the regulations for that scholarship, award or grant permit and the University of Auckland Council is informed and approves. It is the responsibility of the awardee to declare to the Scholarships Office all other scholarships, awards or grant funding received and for which the awardee receives payment while also in payment for this Award.
10. The University of Auckland Council is not obliged to make an award if it is determined there is no candidate that meets the criteria and/or no candidate of sufficient merit.
11. The University of Auckland Council can amend or vary these regulations, provided that there is no departure from the main purpose of the Award.
12. Note [I] below is deemed to be a Regulation.

- I. Awardees will be required to comply with the regulations for the Award and must notify the Scholarships Office of any change in their enrolment or funding status. Waipapa Taumata Rau, University of Auckland may, in the event that it can be established that an awardee is not complying with these regulations, terminate the Award and require repayment of the funds received from the date of the breach.*
