Description

The Award was established in 2003 in honour and memory of Doctor Dorothy Gronwall (1931-2001), who was a University of Auckland PhD student, the first practicing clinical neuropsychologist in New Zealand and an internationally renowned research scientist in the area of neuropsychological consequences of traumatic brain injury. The Clinical Neuropsychology course at the University of Auckland was established by Dr Gronwall.

Selection process

- Nomination is made to the Scholarships Office
- The Award is made by the University of Auckland Council on the recommendation of the Head of the School of Psychology (or nominee)

Regulations

- 1. The Award will be known as the Dorothy Gronwall Memorial Award in Clinical Neuropsychology.
- 2. One Award will be made annually and will be of the value of \$1,800.
- 3. The Award will be made to the Waipapa Taumata Rau, University of Auckland student i) who is enrolled in either the first year of a PhD or a Doctor of Clinical Psychology (DClinPsy), ii) undertaking a thesis in an area of neuropsychology, and iii) who, in the previous year, obtained the highest mark in the School of Psychology course PSYCH 708: Clinical Neuropsychology. As a minimum standard, the student must have achieved at least an Agrade.
- 4. The Award is tenable by domestic or international students.
- 5. The Award will be made by the University of Auckland Council on the recommendation of the Head of the School of Psychology (or nominee).
- 6. The Award will be paid on acceptance of the Award offer and satisfaction of Regulation 7.
- 7. To be paid the Award, the awardee must be i) enrolled in the first year of a PhD or a DClinPsy, and ii) undertaking a thesis in an area of neuropsychology.

- 8. The Award may be held concurrently with any other scholarship, award or grant as long as the regulations for that scholarship, award or grant permit and the University of Auckland Council is informed and approves. It is the responsibility of the awardee to declare to the Scholarships Office all other scholarships, awards or grant funding received and for which the awardee receives payment while also in payment for this Award.
- 9. The University of Auckland Council is not obliged to make an award if it is determined there is no candidate that meets the criteria and/or no candidate of sufficient merit.
- 10. Payments under the terms of this Award remain tax-free as long as they are used for the payment of costs associated with an awardee's programme of study and/or to assist the awardee with living costs while studying (see Note I). Failure to comply with this regulation will result in the termination of the Award.
- 11. The University of Auckland Council can amend or vary these regulations provided that there is no departure from the main purpose of the Award.
- 12. Notes [I]-[II] below are deemed to be Regulations.

Notes

- The tax-free status of this Award is under current legislation. The University of Auckland cannot guarantee this tax-free outcome.
- II. Awardees will be required to comply with the regulations for the Award and must notify the Scholarships Office of any change in their enrolment or funding status. Waipapa Taumata Rau, University of Auckland may, in the event that it can be established that an awardee is not complying with these regulations, terminate the Award and require repayment of the funds received.
