Description

The Prize was established in 2019 and was funded by Dianna Sutherland in memory of her late husband. Dudley Freeman had a lifelong passion for photography as a way of observing and communicating with the world.

The main purpose of the Prize is to recognise and reward the student who has written the most original, creative and interdisciplinary research essay on photography or photographic practices in an Art History course.

Selection process

- Nomination is made to the Scholarships Office
- The Prize is awarded by the University of Auckland Council on the recommendation of the Selection Committee

Regulations

1. The Prize will be known as the Dudley Freeman Prize in Photographic Practices and History
2. One Prize will be awarded annually and will be of the value of \$2,000.
3. The Prize will be awarded to the student enrolled in at least one Art History course whose research essay on photography or photographic practices submitted as part of their coursework is deemed to be the most original, creative and interdisciplinary in the opinion of the Selection Committee.
4. Essays must have been submitted between 1 January and 31 December in the year of the award. Course Directors will be invited to submit essays submitted in the preceding year for consideration in January each year.
5. The Prize will be awarded by the University of Auckland Council on the recommendation of a Selection Committee comprising the Deputy Head (Academic) of the School of Humanities (or nominee), the Major/Specialisation Leader of Art History (or nominee), and another academic staff member nominated by the Head of the School of Humanities.
6. In the event of a tie, the Selection Committee will determine whether the Prize may be shared.
7. The University of Auckland Council is not obliged to make an award if it is determined there is no candidate that meets the criteria and/or no candidate of sufficient merit.

8. The University of Auckland Council can amend or vary these regulations provided that there is no departure from the main purpose of the Prize.
