

# J P Campbell Prize

## Description

This Prize was established under the will of the late Mr J P Campbell of Auckland, who bequeathed to the University the sum of \$500, the income from this sum to be devoted to the provision of a Prize for the student of the University of Auckland annually obtaining the highest marks in the additional law subjects required for the Barristers' Qualification. The Prize is now awarded for the best work in any two final-year LAWCOMM, LAWENVIR, LAWGENRL or LAWPUBL elective courses for the Bachelor of Laws or Bachelor of Laws (Honours).

## Selection process

- Nomination is made to the Scholarships Office
- The Prize will be awarded annually by the University of Auckland Council on the recommendation of the Dean of the Faculty of Law

## Regulations

1. The Prize will be known as the J P Campbell Prize.
2. The Prize will be awarded annually and will be of the value of \$800.
3. The Prize will be awarded to the student who has completed the requirements to graduate with a Bachelor of Laws (LLB) or Bachelor of Laws (Honours) (LLB (Hons)) degree at Waipapa Taumata Rau | University of Auckland in the year of the award, and who, during their programme of study for that degree, has achieved the highest grade point average (GPA) across their two best Part IV LAWCOMM, LAWENVIR, LAWGENRL or LAWPUBL elective courses. As a minimum standard, the student must have achieved a GPA of at least 7.00 (equivalent to an A- grade). In the event of a tie, the student with the best aggregate marks over their two best Part IV LAWCOMM, LAWENVIR, LAWGENRL or LAWPUBL elective courses will be awarded the Prize.
4. The Prize will be awarded by the University of Auckland Council on the recommendation of the Dean of the Faculty of Law (or nominee).
5. The University of Auckland Council will not be bound to award the Prize in any year if there is no candidate of sufficient merit, in the opinion of the Dean of the Faculty of Law.
6. The University of Auckland Council can amend these regulations, provided there is no departure from the main

purpose of the Prize. In particular, if the Statutes will, at any time be amended so as to vary the subjects required to complete the qualification for admission as a Barrister, then the University of Auckland Council will amend these regulations correspondingly, so as to provide for the award of the Prize in conformity with the amended statute.
