## Description

The Prize was established in 2016 and is funded by a bequest from the Musgrove Trust.

The main purpose of the Prize is to recognise and reward excellence in the study and/or performance of Shakespeare and 17th century English Literature at Stage III or above.

## **Selection process**

- Nomination is made to the Scholarships Office
- The Prize is awarded by the University of Auckland Council on the recommendation of the Deputy Head (Academic) of the School of Humanities (or nominee)

## Regulations

- 1. The Prize will be known as the Musgrove Memorial Prize.
- 2. The annual value of the Prize will be \$1,400.
- 3. The Prize will be awarded annually to a full-time student enrolled in Stage III of a Bachelor of Arts (BA) or BA conjoint degree, a Bachelor of Arts (Honours), a Master of Arts or a PhD for outstanding achievement, including but not limited to assessed marks or GPA, in the study and/or performance of Shakespeare or 17th century literature.
- 4. The Prize will be awarded by the University of Auckland Council on the recommendation of the Deputy Head (Academic) of the School of Humanities (or nominee) in consultation with the Major/Specialisation Leaders for English and Drama (or their nominees).
- 5. In the event of a tie, Deputy Head (Academic) of the School of Humanities (or nominee), in consultation with the Major/Specialisation Leaders for English and Drama (or their nominees), will determine if the Prize may be shared.
- 6. The University of Auckland Council is not obliged to make an award if it is determined there is no candidate that meets the criteria and/or no candidate of sufficient merit.
- 7. The University of Auckland Council can amend or vary these regulations provided that there is no departure from the main purpose of the Prize.
