Description

The Prize was established in 2015 and is given in honour of Professor Northey by a grateful alumnus.

The main purpose of the Prize is to recognise and reward student achievement in Immigration and Refugee Law.

Selection process

- Nomination is made to the Scholarships Office
- The Prize is awarded by the University of Auckland Council on the recommendation of the Dean of the Faculty of Law (or nominee)

Regulations

- 1. The Prize will be known as the Northey Prize in Immigration and Refugee Law.
- 2. One Prize will be awarded annually and will be of the value of \$1,000.
- 3. The Prize will be awarded annually to the student who achieved the highest marks in either LAWPUBL 424 Immigration and Refugee Law, LAWPUBL 443 Refugee Law or LAWPUBL 444 Immigration Law or an equivalent course. As a minimum standard, the student must receive an A- grade.
- 4. In the event that LAWPUBL 424, LAWPUBL 443 or LAWPUBL 444 or an equivalent course are not taught in the year of the award, the Prize may be awarded to the undergraduate or postgraduate student who achieved the highest marks for a research essay, dissertation or thesis relating to Immigration Law and/or Refugee Law, or to the student with the highest marks in a course related to human rights selected by the Dean of the Faculty of Law (or nominee).
- 5. The Prize will be awarded by the University of Auckland Council on the recommendation of the Dean of the Faculty of Law (or nominee).
- 6. In the event of a tie, the Dean of the Faculty of Law (or nominee) will determine if the Prize may be shared.
- 7. The University of Auckland Council will not be bound to make an if it is determined there is no candidate that meets the criteria and/or no candidate of sufficient merit.
- 8. The University of Auckland Council can amend or vary these regulations provided that there is no departure from the main purpose of the Prize.
