

# Prasad Prize for High Performance Architecture

## Description

The Prize was established in 2018 and is funded by Deo Prasad AO, an alumnus of the School of Architecture and Planning, who is Scientia Professor and CEO of the Low Carbon Living CRC at the University of New South Wales, and an international authority on sustainable buildings and cities.

The main purpose of the Prize is to recognise and reward excellence in ecologically positive design in studio design projects in years two and three of the Bachelor of Architectural Studies.

## Selection process

- Nomination is made to the Scholarships Office
- The Prize is awarded by the University of Auckland Council on the recommendation of the Head of the School of Architecture and Planning (or nominee)

## Regulations

1. The Prize will be known as the Prasad Prize for High Performance Architecture.
2. One Prize will be awarded annually and will be of the value of \$2,000.
3. The Prize will be awarded to the student who has completed the second or third year of their Bachelor of Architectural Studies and has the highest GPA across either ARCHDES 200, 201 and ARCHTECH 210; or ARCHDES 300, 301 and ARCHTECH 312. In the event of a tie, the Prize will be awarded to the student with the highest GPA across the above named third year courses.
4. The Prize will be awarded by the University of Auckland Council on the recommendation of the Head of the School of Architecture and Planning (or nominee).
5. In the event of a tie, the Head of the School of Architecture and Planning (or nominee) will determine if the Prize may be shared.
6. The University of Auckland Council is not obliged to make an award if it is determined there is no candidate that meets the criteria and/or no candidate of sufficient merit.
7. The University of Auckland Council can amend or vary these regulations provided that there is no departure from the

main purpose of the Prize.
