Description

The Robert Chapman Postgraduate Prize was established in 2007 by the Chapman family and trustees of the Robert and Noeline Chapman Estate.

The main purpose of the Prize is to reward students undertaking a Bachelor of Arts (Honours) or masters programme in Politics and International Relations at Waipapa Taumata Rau, University of Auckland.

Selection process

- Nomination is made to the Scholarships Office
- The Prize is awarded by the University of Auckland Council on the recommendation of the Deputy Head (Academic) of the School of Social Sciences (or nominee)

Regulations

1. The Prize will be known as the Robert Chapman Postgraduate Prize.
2. The Prize will be awarded annually and will be of the value of \$2,000.
3. The Prize will be awarded to the Bachelor of Arts (Honours) or masters student who achieved the highest marks in POLITICS 756 New Zealand Government. As a minimum standard the student must have achieved an A- grade.
4. The Prize will be awarded by the University of Auckland Council on the recommendation of the Deputy Head (Academic) of the School of Social Sciences (or nominee) and the Major/Specialisation Leader for Politics and International Relations (or nominee).
5. In the event of a tie, the Deputy Head (Academic) of the School of Social Sciences (or nominee) shall determine, in consultation with the Major/Specialisation Leader for Politics and International Relations (or nominee) if the Prize may be shared.
6. The University of Auckland Council is not obliged to make an award if it is determined there is no candidate that meets the criteria and/or no candidate of sufficient merit.
7. The University of Auckland Council can amend or vary these regulations, in consultation with the Donor, provided that there is no departure from the main purpose of the Prize.
