## Description

---

The Prize was established in 1990 by the Auckland Goethe Society to commemorate the contribution to the study of German literature by the late Dr Roland Marleyn, Senior Lecturer in German at the University of Auckland from 1956 to 1974.

## Selection process

---

- Nomination is made to the Scholarships Office
- The Prize is awarded by the University of Auckland Council on the recommendation of the Deputy Head (Academic) of the School of Cultures, Languages and Linguistics (or nominee)

## Regulations

---

1. The Prize will be known as the Roland Marleyn Prize in German Literature.
2. One Prize will be awarded annually and will be of the value of \$500.
3. The Prize will normally be expended in the purchase of works relating to German studies.
4. The Prize will be awarded annually to the Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Arts conjoint degree student, majoring/specialising in German, who achieved the highest marks in a Stage III course relating to German literature. As a minimum standard the student must have achieved at least an A- grade. In the event of a tie, the Prize may be awarded to the student with the highest aggregate marks across two Stage III German courses.
5. The Prize will be awarded by the University of Auckland Council on the recommendation of the Deputy Head (Academic) of the School of Cultures, Languages and Linguistics (or nominee) in consultation with the Major/Specialisation Leader for European Studies (or nominee).
6. The Prize may not be shared.
7. The University of Auckland Council is not obliged to make an award if it is determined there is no candidate that meets the criteria and/or no candidate of sufficient merit.
8. The University of Auckland Council can amend or vary these regulations, provided that there is no departure from the main purpose of the Prize.
