

# Tony Cotton Memorial Prize

## Description

The Prize was established in 1976 in memory of the late Dr A N B Cotton, lecturer in History at the University of Auckland from 1972 to 1974. The Prize is funded by subscriptions from relatives, friends, colleagues and students.

The aim of the Prize is to stimulate study and research into European History, particularly seventeenth century British History or related fields.

## Selection process

- Nomination is made to the Scholarships Office
- The Prize is awarded by the University of Auckland Council on the recommendation of the Deputy Head (Academic) of the School of Humanities

## Regulations

1. The Prize will be known as the Tony Cotton Memorial Prize.
2. Two Prizes will be awarded annually and will be of the value of \$250 each.
3. One Prize will be awarded to the student enrolled in a Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Arts conjoint degree, majoring in History, who achieved the highest marks in a course related to European History. As a minimum standard, the student must have achieved at least an A- grade. In the event of a tie, the Prize will be awarded to the student at the highest level of study.
4. One Prize will be awarded to the postgraduate student, majoring in History, who has achieved the highest marks in courses or research relating to European history. As a minimum standard, the student should have achieved at least an A- grade. In the event of a tie, the Prize will be awarded to the student at the highest level of study.
5. The Prize will be awarded by the University of Auckland Council on the recommendation of the Deputy Head (Academic) of the School of Humanities (or nominee) in consultation with the Major/Specialisation Leader for History (or nominee).
6. The University of Auckland Council is not obliged to make an award if it is determined there is no candidate that meets the criteria and/or no candidate of sufficient merit.

7. The Prize may not be shared.
8. The University of Auckland Council can amend or vary these regulations in consultation with the Faculty of Arts, provided that there is no departure from the main purpose of the Prize.
