

# John Mulgan Memorial Prize

## Description

The Prize was established in 1949 by the family and friends of the late Lt.Col John Mulgan, for the encouragement of the study of Greek. Greek was chosen partly because Lt. Col Mulgan was particularly interested in it during his university career and partly because Greece was the scene of his brilliant and gallant war service.

## Selection process

- Nomination is made to the Scholarships Office
- The Prize is awarded by the University of Auckland Council on the recommendation of the Deputy Head (Academic) of the School of Humanities

## Regulations

1. The Prize will be known as the John Mulgan Memorial Prize.
2. One Prize will be awarded annually and will be of the value of \$500.
3. The Prize will be awarded annually to the student in Greek at Stage II, III or Honours level who, in the opinion of staff teaching Greek, has demonstrated the highest level of commitment to the study of Greek as determined by factors including, but not limited to, the number of courses taken in the subject at undergraduate and/or postgraduate level, and the level of contribution and engagement in classwork. As a minimum standard, the student should have a GPA of 7.00 across all courses in Greek. In the event of a tie, the Prize will be awarded to the student at the highest level of study.
4. The Prize will be awarded by the University of Auckland Council on the recommendation of the Deputy Head (Academic) of the School of Humanities (or nominee) in consultation with the Major/Specialisation Leader for Classical Studies and Ancient History (or nominee).
5. The Prize will not be awarded to the same student more than once, save in exceptional circumstances.
6. A portion of the Prize money will normally be expended in the purchase of works relating to Greek studies.
7. The University of Auckland Council is not obliged to make an award if it is determined there is no candidate that meets the criteria and/or no candidate of sufficient merit.
8. If at any time by reason in a fall in the number of students taking Greek or for any other reason the Prize in the opinion

of the University of Auckland ceases to fulfil its purpose, the University of Auckland Council may transfer the Prize to Latin or English or such other subjects as the University of Auckland Council may determine. The University of Auckland Council may at any time hereafter transfer the Prize back to Greek.

9. The University of Auckland Council can amend or vary these regulations provided that there is no departure from the main purpose of the Prize.
