## Description

---

The Prize was established in 2016 and is funded by Jolanda Allen, a former student in Asian Studies.

The main purpose of the Prize is to recognise and reward the student who achieves the highest GPA across two or more Stage II or Stage III language or culture courses in Asian Studies.

## Selection process

---

- Nomination is made to the Scholarships Office
- The Prize is awarded by the University of Auckland Council on the recommendation of the Deputy Head (Academic) of the School of Cultures, Languages and Linguistics (or nominee).

## Regulations

---

1. The Prize will be known as the Jolanda Allen Prize in Asian Studies.
2. One Prize will be awarded annually and will be of the value of \$500.
3. The Prize will be awarded annually to the student enrolled in a Bachelor of Arts (BA) or BA conjoint degree, or Bachelor of Global Studies (BGlobalSt) or BGlobalSt conjoint degree who achieved the highest grade point average (GPA) across two or more Stage II or Stage III language and/or culture courses in Asian Studies, Chinese, Japanese or Korean. At least one language course must be included. As a minimum standard the student must have achieved a GPA of at least 7.00 (equivalent to an A- average). In the event of a tie, the Prize will be awarded to the student who completed the highest number of relevant courses.
4. The Prize will be awarded by the University of Auckland Council on the recommendation of the Deputy Head (Academic) of the School of Cultures, Languages and Linguistics (or nominee) in consultation with the Major/Specialisation Leader of Asian Studies (or nominee).
5. The Prize may not be shared.
6. The University of Auckland Council is not obliged to make an award if it is determined there is no candidate that meets the criteria and/or no candidate of sufficient merit.
7. The University of Auckland Council can amend or vary these regulations provided that there is no departure from the

main purpose of the Prize.
