Description

The Tavistock Trust for Aphasia University Student Prize was established by the Tavistock Trust for Aphasia in 2008. From 2014, the University of Auckland Scholarships Office will administer the Prize on behalf of the Tavistock Trust for Aphasia.

The main purpose of the Prize is to recognise and reward excellent work in the field of aphasia by students enrolled at the University of Auckland.

Selection process

- Nomination is made to the Scholarships Office
- The Prize will be awarded by the University of Auckland Council upon the recommendation of the Head of Speech Science

Regulations

1. The Prize will be known as the Tavistock Trust for Aphasia University Student Prize.
2. The Prize will be £300 and a certificate (see Note I).
3. The Prize will be awarded annually to the student who produces an excellent piece of work in the field of aphasia (see Note II).
4. The Prize will be awarded by the University of Auckland Council upon the recommendation of the Head of Speech Science.
5. In the event of a tie, the Head of Speech Science shall determine, in consultation with the Tavistock Trust for Aphasia, if the Prize may be shared.
6. In the event that the Head of Speech Science determines the criteria have not been met in any given year, the Prize will not be awarded.
7. The University of Auckland Council has the power to amend or vary these regulations in consultation with The Tavistock Trust for Aphasia, provided that there is no departure from the main purpose of the Prize.
8. Notes [I]-[II] below are deemed to be regulations.

Notes

- I. Payment will be made in UK Pounds and paid directly to the recipient by the Tavistock Trust for Aphasia.*
- II. Each year the Selection Committee will determine excellence in a piece of work undertaken by a student in Speech Science in the area of aphasia. Relevant criteria include excellent marks in a specific course, assignment or practical assessment related to aphasia, or a combination of these factors.*
