
Long-term health conditions (LTHC)

One couple without children & one couple with children: 12,858 families


NZ Families and LTHC

3 in 5 families were affected by a LTHC


19% of all families had

more than 2 people with a LTHC


Families had up to eight people with a LTHC




1,532,364 people (49%) had a family member with a LTHC




% of families and individuals affected by a family LTHC




% of people who had a family member with a LTHC




% of people who had a family member with a LTHC by NZ Dep

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New Zealanders aged 15–24 providing unpaid care for someone with a disability or illness


1 in 14 young people aged 15–24 were providing unpaid care for someone with a disability or illness

> 2013 Census data






% who are Young Carers by NZDep
