MKTG 701: Marketing Theory and Practice (15 POINTS)

2021 Semester One

Course Prescription

A core course providing an introduction to marketing philosophy, theory, current debate and advancements in the field. Emphasis is on developing the critical thinking and analytical skills necessary to undertake postgraduate research.

Course Overview

An advanced study of marketing theory relating to contemporary issues in services and relationship marketing. Emphasis is on providing students with in-depth knowledge of key topics and asking them to critically evaluate the field. Examples of topics covered include customer relationship management (CRM); managing service businesses, online platforms, digitization and automation. The course examines how these issues impact on, or are impacted by, marketing practice, consumers' response, and academic "thought". By examining various points of view, students will gain a better understanding of the evolving role of marketing within companies and society.
