# Postgraduate study options in Violence Prevention




The Postgraduate studies related to violence prevention is offered to those who have completed a relevant Bachelors degree or have current relevant work experience in the field.

We would need to assess your qualifications in order to determine whether you meet all the requirements for admission. Assessment of your qualifications occurs during the application and admission process. To start this process, you will need to submit an <a href="Application for Admission">Application for Admission</a> online and all relevant supporting documents. If you have any problems with the on line application process you can call **0800 61 62 63**.

The application closing date for Semester one 2023 is 8 December 2022 and for Semester two 2023 is 4 July 2023.

We recommend you apply before this date, to allow time for admission



processing.

Once your application has been submitted you will receive formal acknowledgement from the University including access information that will allow you to monitor the status of your application on Student Services Online.

## You will need to upload the following Admissions documents:

- An official academic transcript of your highest school level qualifications and all your relevant tertiary qualifications showing grades and completion dates
- A colour passport-sized photo for your University ID card must be uploaded onto your application
- You may be asked for a CV providing information on your qualifications, work experience and professional registrations with any medical body

# You will need to supply the following personal documents:

- Evidence of your name, date of birth and citizenship or permanent residency

   original verified copy
- If you have had a change of name, for example through marriage, such documentation must be provided

SOCCHFAM 700 - Domestic Violence: Challenges and Responses

The courses are offered in teaching blocks (between 4–6 days per course) suitable for distance students or those with employment commitments. Students are expected to dedicate between 10–15 hours per course per week. This includes - preparation, attending lectures, assignments and assessments, which can be tailored toward workplace or practice-based topics. **There are no exams for these courses**. Note that some courses are only offered in one semester.

### Cost:

The approximate cost for each 30 point course is \$2,500. The <u>final costs</u> are confirmed by the University each year.

For 30 point courses, many individuals may be eligible for interest free loans from Study Link.

If you think your employer may contribute toward costs associated with your enrolment, but you need time to confirm this, we encourage you to apply by the deadlines. Note: Course fees will need to be paid by the start of Semester.
