

Get started

Faculty Orientation Day

Each faculty holds its own Orientation Day. There you will receive vital information about your programme of study. You will also have the chance to complete your DELNA Screening (Diagnostic English Language Needs Assessment), which is compulsory for all first-year students. You will be introduced to your UniGuide and be taken on a tour of your campus. Please see your faculty page for more information on this.

Faculty Orientation runs on the following days:



Pōwhiri

Pōwhiri is the welcome ceremony onto a marae. In this case it will also be an official welcome for all new students to the University of Auckland. It removes the tapu (sacredness) of the manuhiri (visitors) to make them one with the tangata whenua (home people).

Student Ambassadors wearing blue t-shirts will be there on your Faculty Orientation Day to help guide you and prepare you.

If you are knowledgeable in Te Reo Māori or any language other than English, you might want to consider being a kaikōrero (speaker on behalf of the students)/ kaiwhakahoki i te karanga (responder to the karanga). If you do wish to speak, please let one of the Student Ambassadors know well in advance.

Diagnostic English Language Needs Assessment (DELNA)

All first-year students, regardless of their language background, must have their academic English assessed at the beginning of their studies.

You'll begin with the DELNA Screening and may be directed to the Diagnosis so that DELNA staff can advise you, if necessary, on further developing your academic English language skills.

Note that your faculty may require you to act on DELNA advice.

You will have the opportunity to complete your DELNA Screening during your Faculty Orientation Day.


