





## What subjects will you study?

During the Foundation Studies Certificate programme, you will study a range of subjects to prepare you for the challenges of degree-level study.

You will study English for Academic Purposes and a choice of four elective subjects.

#### **English for Academic Purposes**

This subject aims to develop students' confidence and competency in understanding, speaking, reading and writing English.

Attention is paid to all areas of study, including accuracy of grammatical structure, spelling, punctuation and word use.

#### Topics include:

- Listening (in small groups, classroom situations and lectures, showing understanding through listening exercises)
- Speaking (one-to-one and small group discussions, formal presentations)
- Reading (note-taking, extended reading, studying of a range of newspaper and magazine articles, showing understanding through formally assessed comprehension exercises)
- Writing (practising different styles, paragraph and note-form summaries, preparation of research reports)

#### **Accounting**

An introduction to accounting methods and concepts.

#### Topics include:

- Cash and accrual accounting
- Budgeting
- · Cash flow
- Depreciation
- · Assessment of performance
- · Accounting systems
- · Job costing
- · Cost-volume-profit analysis
- Financial statements for sole traders and companies

#### Art

Students gain practical knowledge of visual arts and understanding of arts in context, develop ideas through observation, and learn to analyse, interpret and evaluate images.

Please note: Studio space for students who wish to take Art is restricted and a place in this subject is not guaranteed. Priority will be given to students who intend to apply for a Bachelor of Fine Arts, Bachelor of Architecture, Bachelor of Design or another discipline in design. Art is not offered as part of the April, August or October intakes. Offered in January and July only.

#### Biology

This subject aims to develop an understanding of Biology with the ability to communicate facts logically and effectively, design and perform a range of experiments, develop skills in critical analysis, and apply biological knowledge and understanding to the solution of problems. It also aims to foster respect for intellectual honesty in acquiring, presenting and interpreting evidence.

#### Topics include:

- Structure and function of the cell
- Responses of plants and animals to biotic and abiotic factors
- Genetics
- · Evolution primates and hominids

#### **Chemistry**

This practical course provides students with the basis to study science-related courses at university, the knowledge and confidence to test their ideas experimentally, the ability to make informed and responsible decisions, and an enjoyment of science.

#### Topics include:

- · Atomic theory
- Chemical bonding and the shapes of molecules
- Chemistry of metal hydroxides, halogens, selected ions
- Analysis of laboratory solutions and commercial products
- Energy involved in physical and chemical changes
- · Aqueous chemistry
- · Oxidation-reduction and applications
- Organic chemistry; spectroscopic identification of organic compounds

#### **Classical Studies**

An introduction to the history, literature, art, architecture and politics of ancient Greece (600-400 BC) and Rome (753 BC-14 AD). This subject will teach skills that are vital in any degree at university level, including critical thinking, analysis and writing constructive and balanced essays in English.

#### Topics include:

- · Greek myths and the gods
- · Athenian social life
- · Athenian art and architecture
- · Athenian democracy
- · Rome and the rise of the Emperor Augustus
- Roman architecture
- · Greek drama: Medea

#### **Economics**

This subject provides students with an understanding of a wide spectrum of economic issues: basic economic concepts and principles, policy options available for government and the probable consequences of economic decisions.

#### Topics include:

- Relative scarcity and production possibilities
- · Demand, supply and the market
- · Market structures including monopoly
- Externalities, public goods and government intervention
- · Equity and efficiency
- · The financial markets
- Aggregate demand and supply and the macroeconomic economy

#### Geography

Geography is the study of the natural and cultural worlds, and is increasingly relevant in contemporary society as we grapple with the future impacts of climate change, pollution and overpopulation. Students of Geography will study the formation of natural features in the environment, as well as studying cultural processes such as the growth and development of cities. They will also study the impact of humans on the natural environment.

#### Topics include:

#### Physical Geography:

- Coastal processes
- · River processes
- · Geological processes
- · Natural hazards

#### Human Geography:

- · Urban settlements
- Sustainability
- · Climate change

#### **Information Technology**

This subject provides students with a wide knowledge of computer technology, common application software, programming, word processing, spreadsheets and databases.

#### Topics include:

- · Computer hardware
- · Computer software
- · Operating systems
- · Application software for business
- Problem solving techniques used for programming

#### **Mathematics with Statistics**

A prerequisite for many university courses, this subject provides students with a broad range of mathematical knowledge and skills.

#### Topics include:

- · Algebra and graphing of functions
- · Exponentials and logarithms
- Correlation and regression
- Probability and set theory
- · Random variables and their distributions
- · Time series
- · Linear programming
- · Mathematical modelling
- · Binomial, poisson and normal distributions

#### **Mathematics with Calculus**

This subject provides students with a solid foundation for subjects at university that require a prior knowledge of Mathematics with Calculus.

#### Topics include:

- Calculus
- · Algebra
- Trigonometry
- Geometry

#### **Physics**

Students will develop theoretical knowledge, problem solving skills and experimental techniques.

#### Topics include:

- Light
- Waves
- Kinematics
- Mechanics
- · Electricity and magnetism
- Atomic and nuclear physics

Entry requirements and assessment

### Become a student of the University of Auckland

With successful completion of the Foundation Studies Certificate programme, and upon meeting the University entry requirements, you will go on to study your chosen undergraduate degree at the University of Auckland.

#### **Assistance with selecting your course**

The Academic Director at Taylors College Auckland will assist you to select the course that best meets your career aims. You will also have the opportunity to visit the University campus for a day of lectures, tours and talks. If you are studying offshore there will be an opportunity for a 'virtual visit'. This will give you an insight into your degree options, and will introduce you to university life.

#### **Assessment for university entry**

Entry to an undergraduate degree at the University of Auckland is based on the following requirements:

- 1 Meeting the minimum overall grade point average (GPA) for the undergraduate degree
- 2 Meeting the minimum overall English mark for the specific course (minimum 65%)
- 3 Successful completion of the compulsory subjects as specified for the relevant undergraduate degree programme
- 4 Meeting any additional requirements prescribed by the University.
