Minimum GPA Requirements

3.0 (U.S. System)

Minimum Language Requirements

Applicants whose first language is not English must be able to speak, read, write, and comprehend English. English proficiency must be demonstrated by taking the Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL).

The minimum score to be considered for admission, depending on the format of the examination, is 577 (paper-based) or 90 (internet-based).

IELTS test scores are also accepted with a minimum score requirement of 7.0, as well as the Pearson Test of English-Academic (PTE) with a minimum score of 61.

Student Roadmap

The Student Roadmap is designed to help you prepare for your arrival on campus. The Roadmap will guide you through all the various tasks required of new students, including selecting housing, meal plan preferences, and registering for classes.

In order to begin using the Roadmap, you will need to activate your CWRU network ID (instructions will be provided after admission). Use this guidebook to familiarize yourself with your options, then make your selections later via the Roadmap: case.edu/firstyear/transfer-exchange-student-roadmap

Course Registration

You will register for classes through the Student Information System (SIS), <u>sis.case.edu</u>, using your CWRU Network ID and password.

Course registration for the academic year and fall semester opens in April and course registration for spring semester opens in November. Exact dates can be found on the CWRU academic calendar:

Course Schedule

You must enroll in a minimum of 12 U.S. credit hours (per semester) to maintain full-time student status, and you may enroll in up to 18 credit hours (per semester).

You can use the Class Search on the University Registrar's website to begin planning your schedule: case.edu/registrar/registration-classes/class-search

In general, 400 level courses and above are graduate level courses and are not available to students participating in exchange programs.

Academic Resources

Accommodation

There are a variety of housing options available for students studying at Case Western Reserve University. You may choose to live in university-owned housing or in off-campus, privately-owned housing. Whichever you choose, you must secure housing before you arrive in the United States.

University-Owned Housing

University-owned housing options include North and South Campus Residence Halls, the Village at 115th, North Property Management Apartments, the Apartments at 1576, and the Triangle Apartments.

Benefits of living on campus include being part of a community where you will develop long-lasting friendships, and have many opportunities to get involved in student life. You will be able to add your own personal touches to your room so that it will feel like home in no time at all.

Off-Campus Housing

Students also have the option to live off-campus in the University Circle area and surrounding communities. Numerous off-campus options are available for you to explore. Living in University Circle
